ADDITION TO INFORMATION ON D. WILLIAM SCAMMELL

David William Scammell Biography

1920 – Listed in Trenton City Directory as vice president of Maddock Pottery Co., with home at Morris Heights, PA. (A neighborhood of 52 custom-built houses erected beginning in 1900, some bordering on the Delaware Canal)

1920 – January 27 – Purchased home, built between 1800 and 1804, at intersection of Yardley/Langhorne Road and Yardley/Newtown Road. (Later known as Scammell's Corner.) The Scammell family sold this property to developers around 1980.

1922 – U.S. Potters Association officers for 1922, listed on Executive Committee and Art & Design Committee (Crockery & Glass Journal December 1921).

1925 – D. W. Scammell was president of the Trenton Chamber of Commerce.

1928 – April - The Yardley Country Club was organized. D. W. Scammell was on the original board of directors. He and the other members of the board bought shares in the club which afforded them "Life Member" privileges.

19?? – D. W. Scammell had financial interest in Belle Mead Sweetsmakers Co., of Trenton, makers of Belle Mead Sweets brand candy.

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In April 1928, the Yardley Country Club was organized, and D. William Scammell was one of the 15 members of the club's original board. He, along with the other members, purchased shares of stock in the club, which allowed them "life member" privileges.
